## An Exercise in Collaboration - Mei

Mei's first project was in 2009, replacing her carpets with engineered wood. As the floor plans on the lower-level units are all very similar Mei joined forces with a former homeowner to have their floors done as one project. In 2012 Mei renovated her hallway bathroom, creating more storage, improving ventilation and overall flow. The shared project experience from 2009 was so positive that in 2016, when it was time to renovate the kitchen, Dianne and Mei joined forces again, resulting in a beautiful and efficient kitchen and savings in labor, materials, and research time. Mei wanted her projects to be simple, budget friendly and to utilize and maximize her existing floor plans and footprint.

Mei is especially pleased with improvements to storage, lighting and ventilation gained by both her kitchen and bathroom remodels

In the bathroom, I wish I had put in a walk-in shower and a different sink counter.

# Taj Mahal – Bev and Lewis

Bev and Lewis remodeled their upstairs bathroom and installed built-in bookshelves . They love the changes, which improved their living situation. Next they will tackle the downstairs bathroom

- We remodeled our upstairs bathroom in our townhouse unit. We got a cantilevered toilet which we like a lot. We installed all new recessed lighting and put an outlet next to the toilet for a bidet. We installed marble tile throughout including all walls. We used the old vanity and installed a drawer on the side which was previously a cabinet. We covered the old vanity in oak veneer, installed a marble countertop and marble sink on top. This created more room in the cabinet area under the sink. We removed the tub and installed a walk-in shower. The shower is level with the rest of the floor (no shower pan) and includes a rain shower as well as a handheld shower head. A glass panel prevents water from entering the rest of the bathroom when the shower is on. We installed new fixtures for both the shower entrance so the water pressure and temperature could be adjusted before walking into the shower. We replaced the cupboard behind the shower area with an oak cabinet for linens, etc. The doorway is trimmed in oak, and we installed a barn door on the outside to save space. We also cut in two interior windows to let in light from the stairwell skylight. We installed a heated towel bar and a built-in radio and speakers. This is what we will be showing, but people can look at anything that is not a "keep out" area. We will ask that people take off their shoes in the entryway.
- We also remodeled the upstairs alcove. We installed built-in bookshelves and a hardwood floor.


#### **Regrets**?

# Bye Bye Bar – Jules and Bea's Space Gains


Two remodels: kitchen and couple's bedroom/bathroom. B&J also made smaller changes through out their condo

Over the 20+ years we have been here, we did a few changes to optimize the small space we have. We removed the bar that separated living room from kitchen and replaced original appliances with smaller sized ones – we love our kitchen, and the new layout makes it so much more pleasant to be in the space. We changed the hinges of the primary bedroom to open towards the hallway and changed all closet doors to sliding doors. The biggest improvement was changing the door between bathroom and bedroom to a glass sliding door, creating more space in the bedroom and allowing some light into the bathroom. We also removed the shelves from the living room replacing them with a built-in media center with much more storage.

Both the kitchen and bathroom remodels significantly improved our use and experience of those spaces.

#### **Regrets**?

The tile on the bedrooms are very hard, and it takes a toll on an aging body. They can be cold in the winter. In retrospect, we would have chosen a different material and considered radiant heating.

Besides the original color choices, Rebekah loves the work that was done in her home, and she would not do anything different.
